What's in a Name?



Some have asked why Trinity Presbyterian Church is referred to in different ways. Well, take my name for instance. Most of the time, most call me Jeff. My formal given name is Jeffrey William Beebe. My formal title name is The Reverend Doctor Jeffrey William Beebe. From Jeffrey, comes Jeff and a host of other derivatives of which most I don't care much for. As clergy, sometimes I'm Pastor Jeff, sometimes Rev. or Dr. Beebe. And then there's Mr. Beebe or Coach Jeff. My mother and my sister most often call me Jeffrey, as well as my wife when she needs my focus. My older brother calls me J.B. or Jeffrey William while my younger brother calls me Jeff. Many others refer to me as Beebe. In any case, I respond to them all.

Thru the years Trinity Presbyterian Church has been and continues to be referred to in many ways. When the congregation was being established, I recall it was referred to as The Presbyterian Church at Palm Coast. Then Trinity United Presbyterian Church until the merger which created the PCUSA. Now Trinity Presbyterian Church of Palm Coast. As many congregations are often referred, sometimes we simply say TPC or Trinity. Amongst other presbyterian churches and within the PCUSA we are simply Trinity Palm Coast.

According to Thomas S. Rainer, *Church names may be important, by they are not the most important factor in people choosing a church home. Relationships, personal invitations, good preaching, and friendly people, among other reasons, still trump the church name as the reason someone chooses a particular church.*

Like my given name, I am no less Jeffrey William Beebe, my given name of which I share my middle name with my grandfather, my father, and my two brothers, when referred to by another shortened (or lengthened) name. Like Trinity Presbyterian Church of Palm Coast, the congregation is no less that when referred to in other ways.

In most contexts I introduce myself as Jeff Beebe and in most contexts I refer to our congregation as Trinity Palm Coast.

Faith Formation

I am currently finishing up Confirmation Class with 4 of our youth and they are now writing their own personal faith statements. We try to help them organize their thoughts by giving them a guided brainstorming sheet. Every youth that I have ever mentored through this process gets overwhelmed with the Faith Statement. They want to know "the right answers" to the questions and how to make their statement as perfect as possible. They have learned so much from church, parents and mentors that this part is hard for them. I try to make them understand that this isn't about big words, or creative writing, but about who God is.

One of the guiding questions in the faith brainstorming sheet asked: What is the Church and what does it mean to be members of the Church of Jesus Christ? (I always do the assignments with the youth because I don't think it's fair to ask them to do something I wouldn't do myself) and it really made me stop and think about church.

Why is Trinity important to me?

Trinity is a place where my family and I can be a part of the uniquely beautiful family of God. This church "family" is everything to me. My favorite example happened a few years ago. My daughter Hailey got 6 inches of haircut. She returned home from school and soccer and said to me, "Mom, no one even noticed I got my hair cut." That Sunday we went to church, within 5 minutes, Kathy Burns turned around and said, "Hailey you cut your hair, it looks beautiful." She was seen and heard within 5 minutes of stepping into her church family.

I have been asked so many times, how can we get more youth, families, and children to become a part of this church family. These families that we are seeking are going through a lot right now. The childhood years are so sweet but so hard. We have

parents in our church who are caregivers for their aging parents. We have new parents who are experiencing all the stress and sleepless nights that come new life. We have parents who live in constant worry about how they will be able to make it to the next paycheck. I know that young parents aren't the only ones who come to church weary and heavy laden. I know that in our congregation many come on Sunday mornings heavy with life stresses. I share this with you to remind you to "see" one another, to carry one another's burdens, and not think about how we can benefit from new members but how we can help others. When someone new comes to church to visit, make sure they are seen, heard and are reminded that God loves them.

A month ago, during worship I challenged you to ask someone in worship how you can pray for them and ask someone to pray for you. I encourage you make this a part of your Sunday morning routine. Even if you don't worship regularly with us in person, call someone, write an email, send a text. I believe family is why God created us all

On the next page, I have put the Faith Statement Brain Storming Sheet. I encourage you to spend some time thinking about these questions and exploring what you believe. I pray that your faith is strengthened, not by the words of man, but by the power of God.

Jamaica is 60



On Sunday, August 7, 2022, Trinity Presbyterian Church was host to a service celebrating the 60th Anniversary of Jamaica's Independence.

The service consisted of two parts. "Remembering Jamaica in 1960" and the Service of Worship conducted by The Rev. Dr. Barry Davies CD.

There were 93 people in attendance and the service was seen and heard around the world via livestream.

The first half consisted of newsreel footage showing the actual transfer of power ceremony in 1960. There were audio and video clips of native singing and dancing, and a good representation of the Jamaican culture.

Quite a few of the community participated in the service with readings. What beautiful voices speaking with love about their native country.

It was a lively congregation interactive service with the narrative by Dr. Davies who provided interesting facts and commentary throughout. He is really a treat to behold and if you ever get the opportunity to see and hear him talk, play the piano, sing and preach, you owe it to yourself and family to do so.

The welcome and introduction to the worship service was by The Rev. Dan Graham, who did his student preaching in Jamaica. The choir that was made up of 14 voices sang beautifully with the direction and accompaniment by Dr. Davies. The congregation sang with gusto.

His sermon "Change and Decay in All Around I See" focused on the conditions that have changed and not changed in the past 60 years.

He charged us not to look at our watches and no one did because he was so eloquent and interesting throughout.

At the conclusion, those in attendance shared remembrances and fellowship.

We are looking forward to hosting a service in early August, 2023.

World Communion Sunday



Every year on the first Sunday in October, on October 2 this year, Christians around the globe celebrate World Communion Sunday. It is a day to remember that Jesus Christ is the Head of the Church and that every Christian Church and any denomination that promotes Christian unity are one. On this day, people draw faith and inspiration from seeing that they are part of a community that boasts millions of believers and worshippers. John A. Dalles, a pastor from the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America (PCUSA), researched the history of this day. The origin of this day is a brainwave that came to Dr. Hugh Thompson Kerr, pastor of Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh. He came up with this idea in 1930 when he served as moderator of the General Assembly. Dr. Kerr's younger son, Rev. Dr. Donald Kerr, himself pastor emeritus of the Roland Park Presbyterian Church in Baltimore, stated that World Communion Sunday arose from the celebration at the Division of Stewardship at Shadyside. His father had attempted to bring churches together in service of Christian unity, and the idea grew from there. Initially, this idea did not take hold. Whatever celebrations there were grew only incrementally, and people did not give this day a lot of thought. With the Second World War came an increased understanding of one's own mortality, and the spirit of this day caught hold. This day symbolized the effort of bringing the world together, in a spiritual sense, thought Kerr. This celebration was adopted in the U.S., in the period during World War II, and soon, the organization, now known as the National Council of Churches, started endorsing and promoting the event to churches worldwide, led by their leader, Jesse Moren Bader. Many celebrations revolve around the 'Last Supper' theme when Jesus Christ broke bread with his disciples right before he was betrayed by Judas. People even partake in the universal Christian practice of baking bread. Today, this day is celebrated the world over, bringing together the unique flavor of all denominations with a strong individual spirit, just like the world we live in.

Trinity youth have been baking breads from around the world for World Communion Sunday since 1997. This year during Communion you will have a mixture of 3 different breads: Scottish Buttermilk bread, Yemarina Yewotet Dabo, and an Irish Brown Bread.

Our favorite of the 3 breads has always been the Yemarina Yewotet Dabo. It is a sweet bread that is easy to make! We have given you our recipe in hope that you will take the time to make a loaf and invite a friend or neighbor over to share in God's goodness and love.

Yemarina Yewotet Dabo (Ethiopian Spiced Honey Bread)

Makes 1 Large Loaf

Ingredients:

Active dry yeast- 1 (1/4 ounce) packet
Salt- 1 teaspoon
Water, lukewarm- ¼ cup
Egg, beaten- 1
Honey- ½ cup

Ground Cinnamon- 1 teaspoon
Ground Cloves- ½ teaspoon
Ground Coriander- 1 tablespoon
Milk, warm 1 cup
Butter, melted— 6 tablespoons
Flour 4-5 cups



Method:

1. In a small bowl, stir together the yeast and ¼ cup warm water. Set for about 10 minutes to let the yeast proof.
2. In a large bowl, beat together the egg, honey, spices and salt until smooth. Stir in the milk and melted butter.
3. Stir in the flour, ½ cup at a time, mixing to form a soft, smooth dough. Do not add all of the flour if the dough gets too stiff. Add more flour if the dough is too sticky.
4. Remove the dough to a lightly floured work surface and knead for about 10 minutes to form a smooth, elastic dough.
5. Place the dough in a large, lightly oiled bowl, cover with plastic wrap and let rise in a warm place until doubled in size, about 1 ½ hours.
6. Remove the dough again to a lightly floured work surface and punch down the dough and knead for about 1 minute. Form the dough into a round and place on an oiled baking sheet. Allow to rise again for another 30-45 minutes.
7. Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Place bread on baking sheet in the oven and bake for 45 minutes to one hour till bread is lightly browned and sounds hollow when you tap on it. Remove and cool somewhat before slicing.

Water Intrusion/Roof Update



Hopefully you were able to participate in the Congregational Meeting on July 31 to hear the details about our Water Intrusion and Roof. If you were not able to participate, information is posted on a board in the Narthex as well as on our website.

As members of Trinity, we are all responsible for maintaining our facility in order "to be a worshiping, nurturing and serving community" (from Trinity mission statement). We need to promptly address our challenge with roof leaks and water damage by replacing/repairing the roof, repairing damaged stucco, completing mold remediation and subsequent repair of the damaged Sanctuary wall, and painting the exterior of our building. Session established a Roof Task Force which worked diligently to investigate the issues and obtain quotes from contractors. The Task Force unanimously recommended and Session unanimously approved the following solution and associated costs:

Florida Roof	Replace Sanctuary roof, repair damaged roof; install commercial gutter and downspout	\$210,000
Aftermath	Mold remediation in Sanctuary wall	\$9,090

Old School Painting	Power wash, seal and paint exterior of all buildings	\$26,084
TBD	Repair interior Sanctuary wall – PLACEHOLDER COST	\$10,000
TBD	Contingency for additional work, price increases, etc.	\$52,935
TOTAL		\$313,109

Several years ago, an estate gift enabled Trinity to establish a restricted fund that can be used for capital repair. That fund currently contains approximately \$120,000 which can be used for this project. Using this money leaves us with a need of \$193,109 for all of the work shown above. We need \$90,000 of this as soon as possible to repair the roof and stop further damage.

Please consider helping with a one-time gift to pay for these repairs. No gift is too small. We all have different financial situations, but we all have the responsibility to maintain this wonderful facility. These one-time gifts should be marked "Capital Repair".

The step of collecting one-time gifts will run through the end of August. After that time, Session will consider next steps. Trinity has been approved by PCUSA for a Presbyterian Investment Loan if we are unable to raise the funds from our congregation. We hope that congregational response is strong and this loan is not needed.

As of 8/25/2022, we have received 23 gifts totaling \$42,455.00 for "Capital Repairs."

Capital Campaign

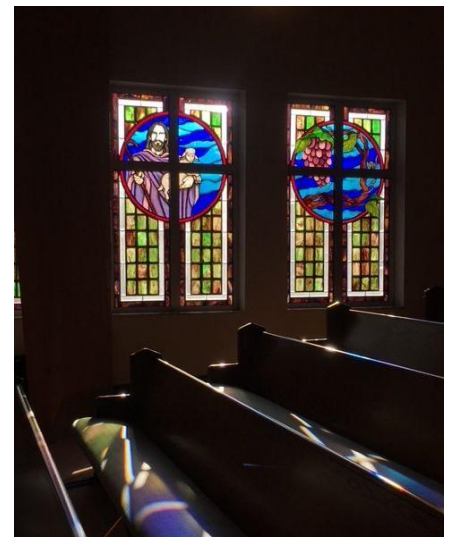


You may remember we celebrated the 40th year for Trinity Presbyterian Church a few years back. We also know that with age comes things breaking down and needing repairs. TPC is no different. A few weeks ago we listened as Rev. Dr. Jeff Beebe and Kathy Cooke explained the current issues in the sanctuary and around our Trinity campus.

We are starting a **Capital Campaign** to help not only repair the damages but bring Trinity back to where it needs to be to ensure we can be faithful stewards and provide for those in need for another 40 years. We will be sharing more information in the next few weeks regarding a timeline and ways that you, a good steward of Trinity, can help provide for these repairs.

Needs:

- *Replace the Sanctuary roof*
- *Repair roof leaks in the Narthex and other areas of our campus*
- *Replace gutters and downspouts*
- *Repair water intrusion in the Sanctuary*
- *Complete mold remediation in the Sanctuary*
- *Repair exterior stucco*
- *Powerwash, seal and paint the exterior of our campus*
- *Repair interior walls in the Sanctuary after mold remediation is complete*

Service and Outreach

After a break from meeting in July and August, the Service & Outreach committee meetings resume September 12th at 10:00 am. We invite anyone interested in helping with Trinity's Mission program to attend the meeting.

The Service & Outreach questionnaires were returned listing local agencies Trinity members help either in person or with donations. From the questionnaires returned, Trinity members donate money to 25 local agencies. The most popular are the Family Life Center and the Salvation Army. Trinity Chinle, Arizona, is one of 10 Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) churches or chapels on the sprawling Navajo Reservation. The Navajo Nation includes 27,425 square miles of land, which makes Navajo the largest American Indian Reservation in the United States. Approximately 173,677 people live in the Navajo Nation. TPC Chinle is part of the Presbytery of the Grand Canyon.

Together with the pastor, they should encourage the people in the worship and service of God, equip and renew them for their tasks within the church and for their mission in the world, visit and comfort and care for the people, with special attention to the poor, the sick, the lonely and those who are oppressed.

Ever thought of being a Deacon?

Do you wonder what their responsibilities are?

Upon becoming a Deacon, they are given a list of members of the church. This is the Deacon's flock to watch over and care for. This flock could be from 8 – 20 people. The Deacon will send out their introduction letter introducing themselves to their flock. A magnet is enclosed with this letter to put on their fridge for easy access to contact the Deacon.

The Deacon will send birthday cards, anniversary cards, Easter cards, Christmas cards, get well cards, thinking of you cards, sympathy cards and any other type of card that fits the situation to their flock. The Board has a supply of cards that you can take from, so purchasing them is not an issue.

The Deacon will contact the flock members by calling them periodically (once a month, if not more). The Deacon will email the flock members or text them. The Deacon may even stop by for a visit. These are all ways for the Deacon to stay in contact with their flock members. It is noted that many times the Deacon does not get a return call when leaving a message. This is not unusual. We will always find a way to stay in contact with our flocks.

The Deacon has a Response Sheet and they keep track each month on this sheet of how they kept in touch with their flock members. This Response Sheet is turned in at the monthly Board of Deacons meeting.

The Board of Deacons meets monthly, the 4th Monday at 5:30. It is strongly encouraged that the Deacons attend the monthly meeting to stay apprised of what's going on.

Noun 1. a body of Church elders and ministers, especially (in Presbyterian Churches) an administrative body (court) representing all the local congregations of a district.

Trinity Palm Coast is member congregation of **Presbytery of St. Augustine**, whose ministry is **to serve Jesus Christ by strengthening its congregations in their ministries and enabling them to accomplish together what none could accomplish alone**. The Presbytery of St. Augustine is one of the 170 presbyteries of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). Our mission is **"to support our faith community, so that together we are a greater witness to the gospel of Jesus Christ!"** Including Trinity Palm Coast there are 54 congregations located in Florida's northeast and north-central regions. Member Spotlight – Jane Pellmann, Clerk of Session

A special thank you to Trinity member, Jane Pellmann who has served as Clerk of Session for the past 20 years!

In addition to other tasks, Jane has served on the Worship Committee for many years and has served on the Congregational Nominating Committee on numerous occasions. As a Clerk of Session at Trinity Palm Coast, she serves a unique and vital role in the Body of Christ. We Presbyterians keep a lot of records and statistics and we follow certain procedures and processes. This doesn't just ensure that we do all things "decently and in order"; it helps us see the larger picture of how God is at work in



and through the Church. Clerks of session not only help tell that story, but also help the congregation fulfill its mission by attending to the details of its corporate life. The role of the Clerk of Session is defined by the Book of Order. "Each council shall elect a clerk who shall record the transactions of the council, keep its rolls of membership and attendance, maintain any required registers, preserve its records, and furnish extracts from them when required by another council of the church. Such extracts, verified by the clerk, shall be evidence in any council of the church. The Clerk of Session shall be a ruling elder elected by the Session for such term as it may determine." (G-3.0104) "The Clerk of Session shall serve as secretary for all meetings of the congregation.

Mrs. Pellmann's responsibilities include: Keeping Records; Minutes of the meetings of the Session; Minutes of the meetings of the congregation; Membership Rolls; Registers; Submitting annual reports required by the Presbytery.

In Relationship to the Pastor: As Clerk of Session she works closely with the pastor, providing invaluable support by: Being prudent in confidential matters that may need to be considered by Session; Providing for agenda planning for meetings; Keeping up with annual requirements, unfinished business, communications, and rolls and register upkeep; Being diligent and timely with the various duties of the clerk; Being knowledgeable about the Book of Order, the Book of Confessions, Roberts' Rules of Order, and the bylaws and manuals of the church and the Presbytery.

As Clerk, Jane also communicates with the Congregation: As the Clerk of Session, she has been the communicating link with the Session, pastor(s), and congregation. Her expertise and promptness in fulfilling the following responsibilities has helped to keep the congregation informed and functioning. As Clerk, Jane sends reminders of Session meetings; Brings to the attention of the moderator, the Session, or appropriate committee of the Session all official communications; Notifies persons, committees, or special groups when they are affected by acts of the session; Releases promptly, after Session has acted, appropriate communications and interpretations for increased communication; and Communicates with the congregation all matters affecting the whole congregation such as: – the calling and purpose of congregational meetings – policies/guidelines established by the Session – summary of minutes of session after their approval – new members received by the Session.

Spiritual Practice: Lectio Divina



Lectio Divina means “divine reading” in Latin. It’s a meditative way of reading the Bible in which we let go of our own agendas and open ourselves to what God is trying to say to us.

Origin

Many historians and theologians credit [St. Benedict of Nursia](#) as the first teacher of Lectio Divina. St. Benedict [spoke](#) to the importance of divine reading in his *Rule of St. Benedict*, encouraging readers to live a life devoted to work and prayer (especially through reading). However, this method of prayer likely originated even earlier than the time of St. Benedict, who passed away during the 6th century.

It wasn’t until a few centuries ago that you could find a Bible in homes, hotels, and churches around the world with the invention of the printing press in the 15th century. It also wasn’t the norm that entire communities had the ability to read or write. Unlike today, with most Christians having Bibles in their homes or access to a digital Bible, communities shared physical Bibles and even relied on certain individuals to read scripture aloud. This practice of listening to Scripture read aloud was very popular in monastic communities — prompting them to [“listen with their hearts.”](#)

It’s not the same as Bible study

While Lectio Divina is a great way to study the Bible, it isn’t the same thing as a Bible study. Lectio Divina offers something more specific, more personal to you, in the moment you are praying. Bible studies lead us to interpret the Bible by asking questions and at times, doing research, and looking at the Bible as a whole. Lectio Divina, on the other hand, asks us to intentionally focus on a short section of Scripture. This prayerful focus could be one passage, one verse, or even just one word.

How to pray: Lectio Divina

The time you spend praying the Lectio Divina is entirely up to you and varies by person.

1. **Read**
Or using a Bible app, [listen](#). Take a short passage from the Bible and read/listen to it carefully. Let it soak in.
2. **Meditate**
Then, after reading or listening for a second time, consider: What sticks out to you? Perhaps it’s a particular image, phrase, or single word. Let that be your focus, meditating on what God might be trying to show you through what stands out.
3. **Pray**
Respond to the text and to God. Ask God to show you what He wants you to take from it. This could lead you to offer thanks, ask forgiveness, or simply talk with God about what the passage brought to your heart.
4. **Contemplate**
Rest with God. Be aware of God’s presence with you. Listen for His voice.

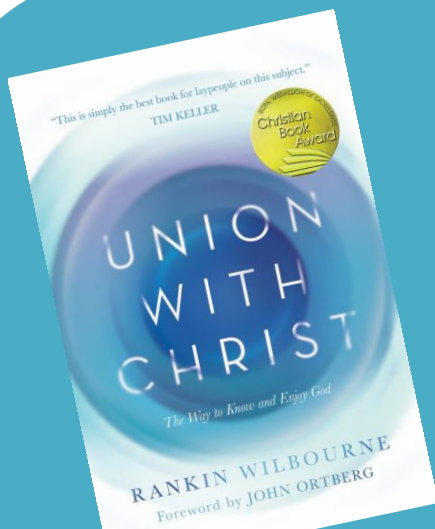

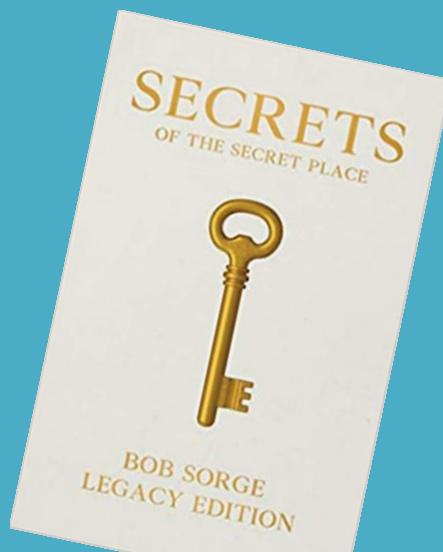

All Saints' Day



Greek icon of saints and angels around Christ's throne (c. 1700).

In early Christian tradition, saints' days began as a way to mark the anniversary of a martyr's death — his or her "birthday" as a saint. By the middle of the church's first millennium, there were so many martyrs (particularly due to the persecution of Diocletian) that it was hard to give them all their due. All Saints' Day was established as an opportunity to honor all the saints, known and unknown.

All Saints' Day has a rather different focus in the Reformed tradition. While we may give thanks for the lives of particular luminaries of ages past, the emphasis is on the ongoing sanctification of the *whole* people of God. Rather than putting saints on pedestals as holy people set apart in glory, we give glory to God for the ordinary, holy lives of the believers in this and every age. This is an appropriate time to give thanks to members of the community of faith who have died in the past year. We also pray that we may be counted among the company of the faithful in God's eternal realm.

All Saints' Day has been celebrated on November 1 since the year 835. Previously it had been connected with the Easter season as a feast of all martyrs.

Trinity will offer an All Saint's service of prayer and remembrance on Tuesday evening, November 1st at 5:30 PM in the Sanctuary.

CCPC started at Trinity holding their first rehearsal in October 2010 and their first concert on January 30, 2011.

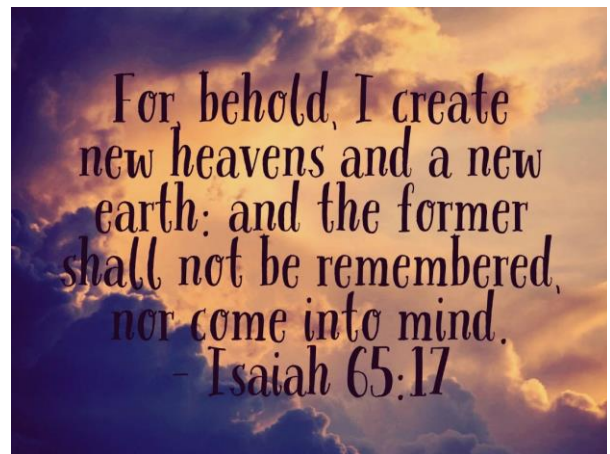

What did you find shifting through your memories?

The sermon from a recent Sunday morning got me thinking about my parents. Growing up I didn't think too much about our daily routines such as saying a blessing before we ate, going to church on Sundays then resting the rest of the day, or the morning devotionals and prayers we did every morning before school. It was just the ways things were for us.

But as I shift through my memories, I can identify how my parents lived out their faith. Mother was an educator early in her life. When her mother became ill with cancer, she took time off to care for her. But her life seemed defined by her love of God, children, and babies. When I knew her, she was always supporting young families whether it was teaching Kindergarten at church, maintaining the Cradle Roll, teaching the young women's circle Bible study, and even after her death funding the renovation of the nurseries at church.

My father lived more in the shadows. He had an office on the side porch where he kept his checkbooks. I discovered as I grew older that one of his checkbooks was for giving. Giving to folks in need and worthy projects was his hidden talent and he made sure there was always something to give. He kept track of it through this one account. It wasn't until after his death and I was shifting through his desk on the porch, that I found the letters from children at Thornwell. The names were consistent as he had supported them through the years and their thanks was genuine. I knew nothing of this generosity until then, but marveled at the impact on the future it had for those children and young adults.

On Sunday mornings before church, he met one of doctors at the hospital and conducted a Sunday School Class for the patients, their families, and staff. It began humbly in the Emergency Room and eventually moved to a chapel built for this purpose on campus in later years. Sometimes I would accompany him. We would go room to room asking if anyone would like to attend, then wheel or walk them down. The doctor taught the lesson.

After returning everyone to their rooms, we headed off to our church.

While my parents revealed God's love through their actions, they also gave me suggestions for maintaining and bridging relationships with others. Mother taught me that it is better to work along side people rather than telling them what they needed to do. I believe her exact words were, "Never ask anyone to do anything you have not done yourself or are not willing to do with them." Daddy gave me some excellent advice once when I had gotten myself in a pickle with one of my best friend's mother. We disagreed and I was sure I was correct, and she was wrong. I was a teenager, enough said. We had words and I was unhappy about it because she would not acknowledge my point of view, I felt unvalued, and our relationship seemed broken. We were at a stand still. Daddy knew I was miserable. He came to me, and we talked and he said, "Go and apologize, Martha. Find something in the situation to apologize for. You are certainly sorry for the furry the situation has generated and even if you cannot agree, you are sorry that the relationship you had enjoyed seems broken." So, I did, and things were better than I could have ever imagined. Good life advice that I am indebted to him for.

So growing up I was unknowingly saturated by daily routines that strengthened my faith. I witnessed my parents use their talents to leave a legacy of God's love in unique ways wherever they were throughout their lives. They shared with me advice that has served me well throughout my life. Now I am challenged to shift through my own life and try to decide how I will make a difference and extend God's love to others. I challenge you to join me in looking for ways to extend and share God's love with others, right now at Trinity, whenever and however we can!

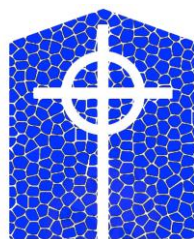
